



Sector Profile - South Sudan 2024

Our Purpose in Action

According to the 2024 Humanitarian Needs and Response Plan, an estimated 9 million individuals in South Sudan will require humanitarian assistance. This includes a staggering number of over 2.2 million Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs). The situation is compounded by the ongoing conflict in Sudan, which began in April 2023. As a result of this crisis, there has been a significant influx of returnees and refugees into South Sudan, exacerbating the already dire circumstances.

The persistent occurrence of natural disasters, conflicts, and instability in both South Sudan and its neighboring country, Sudan, has led to a substantial displacement of civilians. Many people have been forced to flee their homes and seek refuge at transit centers, Protection of Civilian sites (PoCs), and IDP sites as a result the urgent need for CCCM interventions is evident throughout the country.

Sector Goal

The primary objective of DRC's CCCM work is to facilitate a well-coordinated and comprehensive response across various sectors, while minimizing redundancy in service provision. This entails effective coordination, efficient information management, proper site maintenance, capacity building, sound governance, active community engagement, and accountability to the affected population. DRC offers CCCM services to displaced individuals residing in 11 IDP sites within Upper Nile and Unity States, as well as 2 refugee camps (Ajoung Thok and Pamir) in Ruweng Administrative Area in South Sudan.

What We Do

Camp Coordination



DRC plays a crucial role in coordinating organizations that respond to crises in displacement areas. Beyond coordination, DRC also offers vital support to community leaders. This support includes capacity-building through training programs, aimed at enhancing their ability to coordinate effectively and share information efficiently.

Efficient Information Management



DRC is involved in information management for humanitarian response within areas of displacement, including service mapping to identify available services for displaced populations, 5Ws/site tracking to monitor displacement sites, conducting population headcounts for accurate needs assessment, and creating site profiles detailing demographics and challenges.

Site Maintenance

DRC implements site improvement initiatives primarily through the cash for work modality, to maintain the sites, such as bush clearance, drainage reopening, dyke and water retention basin upkeep, as well as foot bridge construction and repair.

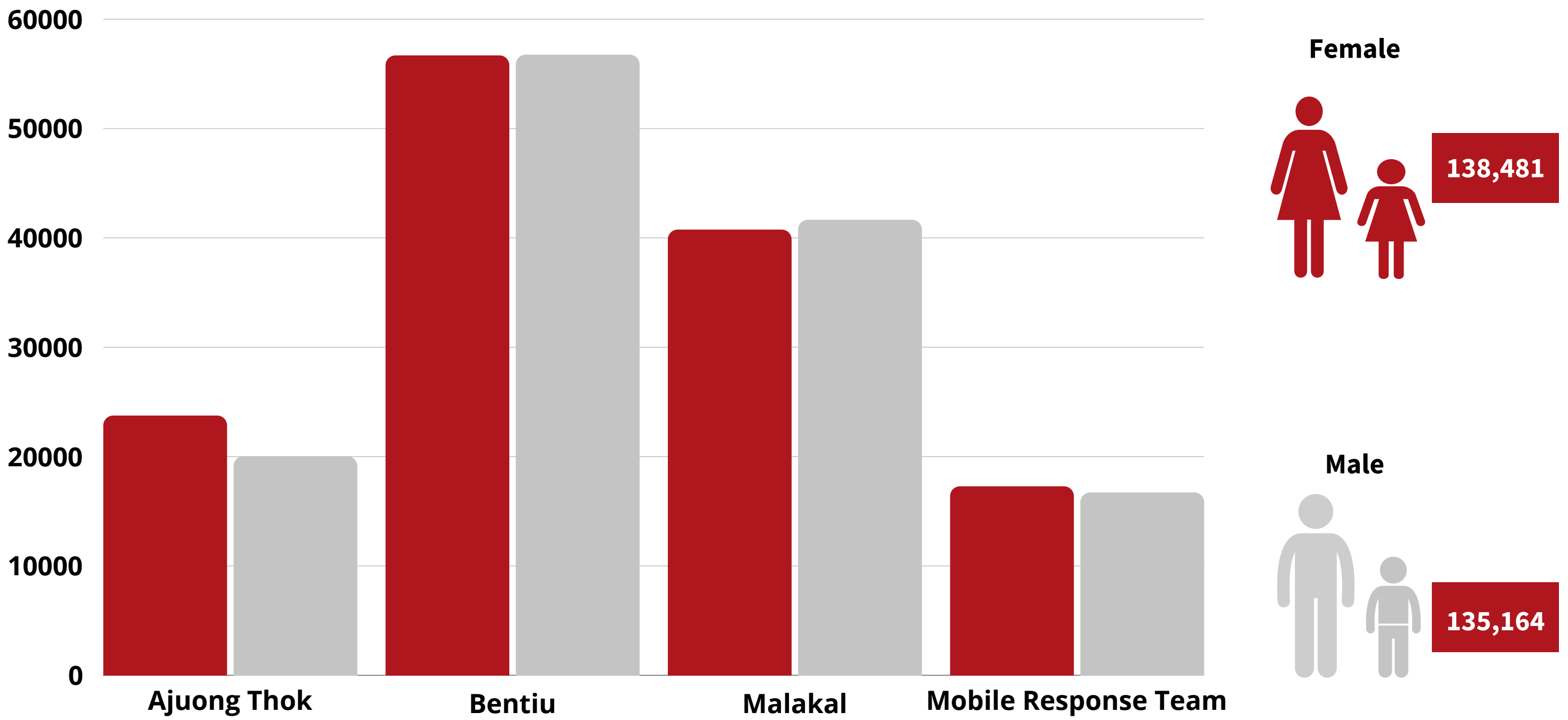


Capacity building and community engagements

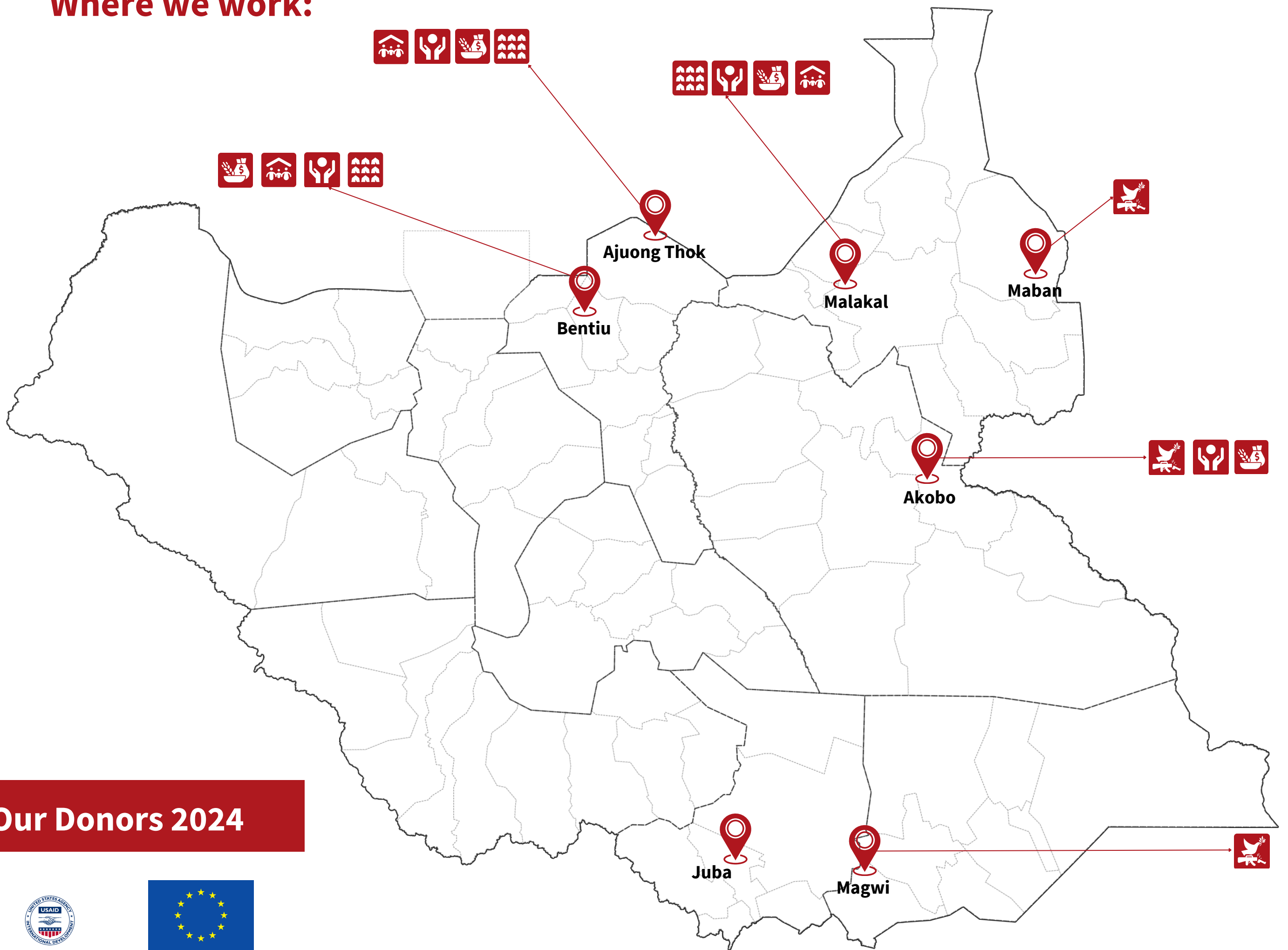
